# **DECLARATION OF JOHN PERROTTI, M.D.**

I, John Perrotti, M.D., declare as follows:

- 1. I am a physician that has been retained by Plaintiff Chloe E. Brockman as an expert witness in the above-captioned matter.
- 2. I make this declaration in support of Plaintiff's Motion for Leave to Amend Complaint to State Claim for Punitive Damages.
- 3. I am over the age of eighteen and am competent to testify as to the matters herein. The following is based on personal knowledge unless otherwise stated.
- 4. I am certified by the American Board of Plastic Surgery and am a plastic surgeon licensed to practice medicine in New York and Florida.
  - 5. Attached hereto as **Exhibit 1** is a true and correct copy of my curriculum vitae.
- 6. I am familiar with Chloe's clinical history; the "Gender Affirming Care" ("GAC") she was provided; and her subsequent detransitioning.
- 7. Based on my review of the foregoing, I have formed the following opinions, which are based on my training and experience as a plastic surgeon.
- 8. My opinions are also informed by research I conducted regarding Kaiser Foundation Hospitals, Inc. and The Permanente Medical Group, Inc.'s (collectively, "Kaiser") provision of mastectomies for the treatment of gender dysphoria.
- 9. Chloe's medical records indicate that Dr. Susanne E. Watson recommended that Chloe, who was not yet fifteen years old, undergo a double mastectomy on the basis of a single, two-hour consultation.
- 10. As a preliminary matter, breast surgery should never be performed on a minor without a substantial reason and justification for providing such a surgery. Minor girls are inadequately developed physically and psychologically to undergo such a surgery. Regarding breast augmentation, the American Society of Plastic Surgeon's Policy Statement for aesthetic breast surgery in teenagers <sup>1</sup> states as follows:

"Recommendations: Adolescent candidates for (purely) aesthetic breast augmentation should be at least 18 years of age. Breast augmentation that is done for aesthetic reasons is best delayed until the patient has sufficient emotional and physical maturity to make an informed decision based on an understanding of the factors involved in this procedure. This includes being realistic about the surgery, expected outcome and possible additional surgeries. In considering emotional maturity for breast augmentation, the patients should request the procedure for themselves, not to satisfy another's perception of the patient. In addition, they should demonstrate sufficient emotional maturity to understand all aspects of this surgery. This would include having realistic expectations of the procedure itself, the outcome and the potential for future surgeries. Adolescent patients need to understand that, while implants can be surgically removed, the procedure may leave permanent changes on the body, including scarring and tissue changes."

Although augmentation is not the issue in this case, the need for emotional and physical maturity to make a decision to totally remove one's breasts applies even more dramatically, and teenagers under age 18 years of age should never receive a mastectomy, unless there is a serious reason for requiring such a surgery.

- 11. Until recent years, mastectomies have never been requested by or for minor patients, and even now they are requested only in the context of a minors seeking to remove otherwise healthy breast tissue in order to transition to appear more like the opposite sex. In this context, there has been an unexplained, exponential increase in requests for breast removal surgeries. A 2022 study involving Kaiser patients states: "Compared with adults, research on gender-affirming surgery in adolescents is more limited. The incidence of referrals or requests for gender-affirming mastectomy in adolescents has risen exponentially over the past decade. Although studies have evaluated the increase in gender-affirming surgery in adults, we know of none that report the incidence of gender-affirming mastectomy in adolescents." Gender-Affirming Mastectomy Trends and Surgical Outcomes in Adolescents, Annie Tang, MD, et al., MD (Ann. Plast. Surg. 2022;88: S325–S331). The provision of mastectomies on minor girls exploded from just several per year in 2013 to nearly 50 in 2019. (Ann. Plast. Surg. 2022;88: S325–S331.) Kaiser's Northen California health system has performed over 200 mastectomies on minor girls between 2013 and 2020. Id.
  - 12. The efficacy of this so called "treatment" is dubious at best. I am aware of no long-

term, control group studies demonstrating the efficacy of treating the psychological diagnosis of "gender identity disorder" or "gender dysphoria" with surgical rather than psychiatric/psychological interventions, particularly in minors. Indeed, the evidence in this area, particularly as to minors, strongly supports the opposite conclusion that use of psychotherapy to treat and alleviate symptoms from this psychological diagnosis is the best course of treatment.

- health outcomes are low to very low-quality at best. These low-quality studies typically involve a short follow-up period of 1-2 years, suffer from serious selection bias, response bias, reporting bias, and other types of bias, and have no randomized control group which is the gold standard in medical research. On the other hand, the best studies that exist in this area are two 30-40-year population-based studies out of Sweeden and Denmark respectively. <sup>2</sup> Although similar to the other studies in this area they involve no randomized control groups, each of these studies analyzed data from the entire populations of each respective country and span a period of 30-40 years respectively. Thus, the length of these studies and the quantity of analyzed data immensely exceeds that of any other studies of mental health outcomes for those undergoing sex-reassignment treatment. These two studies conclusively establish that individuals who undergo sex-reassignment "treatment" continue to be at a significantly increased risk of suffering from serious mental health morbidity, suicidality, and completed suicide attempts as compared with the general population even after the so-called "treatment" is performed. They indicate a completed suicide attempt rate that is

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13	16. Desistence rates are also a critical issue for minors who desire to receive sex
14	reassignment surgery. As to minors, eleven unchallenged studies of desistence rates in youth show
15	that around 80%-90% of minors desist from an opposite sex gender identity upon reaching
16	adulthood. <sup>8</sup> The American Psychiatric Association DSM-5 identifies these same desistence rates
17	based on the same studies. 9 Thus, every indication from these studies is that the vast majority of
18	youth who undergo permanent sex-reassignment "treatment" will come to regret their decision and

have devastating physical changes to their body because they will eventually desist from their transgender identity.

- 17. With respect to general suicide risk in mental healthcare, psychotherapy has been successfully employed to reduce such risk. As an example, in a systematic review of the effectiveness of psychotherapy on suicidal outcomes, it was found that in twenty-three assessed studies, there was a "decrease of suicidal ideation rates in 95.7% of them." With respect to suicide attempts, seventeen studies were examined and 88.2% showed positive (good) results. (*Id.*). Given that a high percentage of adolescents have comorbid psychiatric conditions in association with gender dysphoria, a reasonable approach to treating these young people (and avoiding the harms of hormones and surgeries) would be to employ such psychotherapeutic approaches.
- 18. In summary, for the reasons summarized above and other reasons, a double mastectomy should never be performed on a minor without a serious and immediate need to perform such a surgery. A "gender dysphoria" or "gender identity disorder" diagnosis does not constitute such a serious and immediate need. Minors have a high rate of desistence and there is no reliable evidence demonstrating that such treatment is efficacious. There is also no reason why a permanent, irreversible, and likely devastating physical change should be preferred over non-permanent and standard psychotherapy methods. Any requests by a minor to receive a double mastectomy for the purpose of sex-reassignment should be delayed until at least 18 years of age and re-evaluated at that time. Performing such a surgery on a 15-year-old biologic female like Chloe constitutes a deliberate decision to ignore the available medical evidentiary research on this issue, and represents a knowing and deliberate breach of the relevant standards of care.
- 19. Additionally, this willful and deliberate breach of the standard of care is aggravated by a concurrent failure to provide informed consent regarding any of the risk issues discussed above. Based on my assessment of the discussions that took place between Chloe and Dr. Hop Nguyen Le,

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Chloe's cosmetic surgeon, Dr. Le provided Chloe only with the type of information about a double mastectomy that a (typically adult) cancer patient receives, and not facts specific to her situation as a minor with gender dysphoria and healthy breasts. The available evidence in the medical records and in declarations filed concurrently herewith indicates that Dr. Le failed to discussed any of the following with Chloe and/or her parents: 1) high desistence rates for minors and the high risk of regret based upon the same, 2) the option of receiving psychotherapy instead, 3) the high risk of continued increased psychiatric morbidity and suicidality even after completing sex reassignment, 4) the lack of long term, randomized control studies in this area and the low-quality of the medical research upon which this proposed treatment is based, 5) the long term implications of testosterone on the female reproductive organs and the eventual need for a complete hysterectomy, 6) the implications on intimacy and relationships of having a masculinized chest but female reproductive organs, and 7) the next step of "bottom surgery," the related high complication rates and resulting lifelong medicalization. These, among potentially others, represent critical issues of informed consent pertaining to performing a double mastectomy in Chloe's situation. The failure to convey this critical information further buttresses the existence of a deliberate intent to cause Chloe harm by concealing from her and her parents' any information that might dissuade them from continuing down this destructive path. As a result, on Defendant Le's recommendation, Chloe has now deliberately incurred a permanent physical injury that she now severely regrets.

20. In addition to all of the foregoing, a proper psychological evaluation is also a critical pre-requisite to any consideration for surgery on a minor. In 2012, the American Psychiatric Association ("APA") Task Force on the Treatment of Gender Identity Disorder advised that teens be "screened carefully" for trauma as well as for other psychiatric disorders that may produce gender confusion. The APA Handbook on Sexuality and Psychology states: "Premature labeling of gender identity should be avoided. . .This approach runs the risk of neglecting individual problems the child might be experiencing and may involve an early gender role transition that might be

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22. Additionally, well established research on the plasticity of minors' cognitive functions, notes as follows:

Practice With Transgender and Gender Nonconforming People" states: "Additionally, adolescents

can become intensely focused on their immediate desires, resulting in outward displays of frustration

and resentment when faced with any delay in receiving the medical treatment from which they feel

they would benefit and to which they feel entitled." This intense focus on immediate needs may

create challenges in assuring that adolescents are cognitively and emotionally able to make life-

altering decisions to change their name or gender marker, begin hormone therapy (which may affect

The 2015 American Psychological Association "Guidelines for Psychological

Brain maturation during adolescence (ages 10–24 years) could be governed by several factors...sex hormones including estrogen, progesterone, and testosterone can influence the development and maturation of the adolescent brain...Furthermore, the adolescent brain evolves its capability to organize, regulate impulses, and weigh risks and rewards; however, these changes can make adolescents highly vulnerable to risk-taking behavior...Plasticity permits adolescents to learn and adapt in order to acquire independence; however, plasticity also increases an individual's vulnerability toward making improper decisions because the brain's region-specific neurocircuitry remains under construction, thus making it difficult to think critically and rationally before making complex decisions.

23. WPATH Society Standard 6.3 for adolescents requires "a comprehensive biopsychosocial assessment" before receiving GAC. WPATH Society Standard 6.12.d for adolescents counseled that a patient's "mental health concerns that may interfere with diagnostic clarity, capacity to consent, and gender-affirming medical treatments have been addressed." concerns should be addressed as part of the overall treatment plan." WPATH SOC 7 required that Defendants conduct an "extensive exploration of psychological, family, and social issues."

- 24. Just because surgeons may not be trained in psychological evaluation does not absolve them of the responsibility of conducting some basic common-sense inquiry into the reasons and motivations for a patient, particularly a minor patient, seeking to remove healthy breast tissue. The surgeon should also review the psychological evaluation report and confirm that it has properly and thoroughly performed by a properly trained mental health professional.
- 25. Based on the medical records and Ms. Brockman's declaration testimony, Dr. Le failed to perform any inquiry into the underlying motivations for Chloe's surgery request, her related mental health history, her mental health history in the months leading up to the surgery, which had declined including Chloe's first experiences of suicidal ideation. Dr. Le failed to ensure that adequate mental health evaluation was performed. Dr. Le also failed to discover that Chloe's concern for being further sexually assaulted was one of her motivations for seeking the surgery. This fact should have been discovered by some basic inquiry, should have immediately prompted a stop to any further surgery, and should have resulted in further extensive psychological evaluation and therapy. Instead, Dr. Le rubber stamped the file and performed the surgery. The failure to perform any basic inquiry regarding Chloe's request for surgery further supports that this was a deliberate scheme to push Chloe through the transgender conveyor belt without any regard for the severe physical harm that it would cause to Chloe.
- 26. This complete failure on the part of the entire team of treating providers with regard to Chloe's utterly failed sex-reassignment "treatment" further demonstrates a systemic failure caused by deliberate institutional decisions on the part of the hospital and medical group to deliberately push sex-reassignment "treatment" on minors regardless of the poor-quality evidence and severe risk of causing serious permanent injury to minor patients participating in this so-called "treatment."
- 27. In summary, based on my professional judgment and experience as well as information summarized above and other information that I have reviewed as well as Chloe's files

1	in this matter, Dr. Hop Nguyen Le deliberately and knowingly deviated from the standard of care
2	by performing a double mastectomy on Chloe at age 15, deliberately and knowingly concealed
3	critical information that should have been a fundamental part of any informed consent discussion in
4	Chloe's case, and deliberately and knowingly avoided any inquiry into Chloe's motivations for
